Mark 1:40 - 45 GNB

- ⁴⁰ A man suffering from a dreaded skin disease came to Jesus, knelt down, and begged him for help. "If you want to," he said, "you can make me clean."
- ⁴¹ Jesus was filled with pity, and reached out and touched him. "I do want to," he answered. "Be clean!" ⁴² At once the disease left the man, and he was clean.
- ⁴³ Then Jesus spoke sternly to him and sent him away at once, ⁴⁴ after saying to him, "Listen, don't tell anyone about this. But go straight to the priest and let him examine you; then in order to prove to everyone that you are cured, offer the sacrifice that Moses ordered."
- ⁴⁵ But the man went away and began to spread the news everywhere. Indeed, he talked so much that Jesus could not go into a town publicly. Instead, he stayed out in lonely places, and people came to him from everywhere.

Address Helplessness, Hurt and Hope

TextMark 1 : 40-41
"Sir, if you want to, you can make me clean" "I do want to - be clean!"

There is something about his story that captures us - and I think it is because this story sounds so real. So what is it that we hear in those words of the man suffering from that dreaded skin disease? We hear perhaps 3 things: i) helplessness and hurt ii) humility and iii) hope, as he puts himself into the hands of Jesus.

Helplessness and Hurt

The cry is first of all a cry of helplessness. This person has been inflicted with a disease over which he has no control, 'dreaded skin disease' tells it all. It is a disease that has taken over his whole life being ostracised, isolated, and alone . A disease furthermore that meant that he was labelled 'ritually unclean'. It was a physical disease that reduced him to a state of helplessness, not only physically but emotionally, mentally, spiritually and socially. He cries out from his helplessness and hurt.

Humility

Perhaps it is because of this very helplessness and hurt that we hear another cry in these words "Sir, if you want to, you can make me clean" It is the voice of humility. We can only guess what it cost this person to humble himself and come and beg at Jesus feet, "when he saw Jesus he threw himself down and begged him". The man has the humility to come and place himself totally in Jesus hands. What a risk to take. Perhaps he was only able to take it because he had seen the light of love in Jesus eyes. Love and understanding reaching out to him.

Hope

Certainly there is a third cry we hear in the man's words. For we hear a voice of hope. For the man sees the possibility of change because of Jesus. Perhaps he doesn't know how or why or when, but his contact with Jesus has brought him what he never had before. In Jesus he saw hope. And so he comes and lays his burden down before Jesus in helplessness and hurt, humility but also in hope.

Jesus Reply

The man had asked 'Sir, if you want to.....'. Jesus reply is completely unequivocal 'I DO WANT TO.....'. What music to the man's ears. What music to our ears as we live with the confusion and doubt that the corona virus brings, as well as physical and mental illness. Jesus says "I do want to..."

The man has come, placed himself in Jesus hands and Jesus makes him clean. Those words imply a healing not only of physical disease but the emotional, mental, spiritual, and social disease that affected his whole being. It was a healing that brought outward and inner peace.

And so we too are invited, in humility, to bring our helplessness and hurt and find hope and healing in Jesus as we lay our burdens down.

We will show both hurt and hope ... Like the hands of the Lord.


