- ³ The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, tell this stone to become bread."
- ⁴ Jesus answered, "It is written: 'Man shall not live on bread alone.'[b]"

Silent prayer

Thoughts

With the announcements this week of the path out of lockdown some people seem very excited about what they will be able to do once more. I've heard of the big sporting events people hope to once more attend, live concerts and festivals where people hope to be part of the audience. For some the longing to be part of a large event is almost overwhelming. For others this is their worst nightmare, large crowds, hustle and bustle all signal something to be avoided. Perhaps I'm alone in feeling that sometimes these large events are some of the strangest places to be, so often even though there are many people there doesn't seem to be any connection made between them.

Jesus was often surrounded by large crowds, often he was the main attraction, people flocked to hear him. There were those who followed him all over and amongst these where the 12 who were almost constant companions. Yet Jesus felt the need to seek time in solitude. Solitude is very different to loneliness. Solitude is denoted by a positive state of mind, and this results in inner peace and a pleasant tranquillity. Jesus sought solitude so He could spend time alone in communion with God. We too need to enter into solitude, spending time alone with God so that we can listen to him. In Luke 4:4 Jesus reminds us of the need to be recharged spiritually

'Man shall not live on bread alone.'

Spending time alone with God gives us the opportunity to change and to become more like him, seeing the world through his eyes and letting the world see Christ in us.

So have you made any plans for the coming weeks and months. Any trips on the horizon? How much 'stuff' will you take with you? I'm prone to carrying a large handbag – I can usually fit a hammer and screwdriver in there alongside my Bible, notebooks and electronics! Necessary? Definitely not! We are all prone to carrying too much baggage, mentally and physically, but Jesus didn't the need for the extras. He rebuked Satan for tempting him with worldly goods. When Jesus called his disciples they simply left what they were doing and followed him. When he sent out the 72 he told them not to take anything. We, like them, need to put our faith in God and he will provide for us. It's not that he calls all of us to have no possessions or live as simply as he did. For some it might be that way but for many of us its about putting God first. When we focus on God everything else will seem less important. Take yourself into that solitude, turn off all the unnecessary extras and listen. God speaks to us but too often we allow the material trappings of life to drown him out.

Of course the other thing Jesus did during those 40 days and nights was that he fasted. For 40 days and 40 nights he went without food. We think we've done well if we go without chocolate for 6 days of the week during Lent, no food for over one month. The practise of fasting is not as wide spread as it once was but if you've ever tried it you will know it is difficult. Sometimes when we've simply 'given up' a foodstuff we see it as a sacrifice, a hardship, something we can be boastful of. If that is what we do then we are missing the point. The purpose of a fast is that we give something up in order to focus on God, listening to him, seeking his way for our lives (perhaps more appropriately now, when food prep is shorter, that we give up electronic devices or a pastime that we focus on). Satan tempted Jesus by challenging who he was. 'if you are the Son of God...' perhaps we need to challenge ourselves, to whom do we belong.

Let us try to live a simple life this week, spending time listening, in the silence, for God's word to us.
