Reading John 15:1-8

"I am the true vine. My Father is the gardener. He cuts off every branch joined to me that does not bear fruit. He trims every branch that does bear fruit. Then it will bear even more fruit. You are already clean because of the word I have spoken to you. Remain joined to me, just as I also remain joined to you. No branch can bear fruit by itself. It must remain joined to the vine. In the same way, you can't bear fruit unless you remain joined to me. "I am the vine. You are the branches. If you remain joined to me, and I to you, you will bear a lot of fruit. You can't do anything without me. If you don't remain joined to me, you are like a branch that is thrown away and dries up. Branches like those are picked up. They are thrown into the fire and burned. If you remain joined to me and my words remain in you, ask for anything you wish. And it will be done for you. When you bear a lot of fruit, it brings glory to my Father. It shows that you are my disciples.

Thoughts

At Keswick Methodist, as many of you know, we have a car park. Understandably it is very popular and over time it has gradually become a bit of an eyesore. As property steward I have taken the opportunity during the pandemic to try and improve matters so that it looks better for our neighbours. A really mucky part has been swept so the muck doesn't wash into the drains, white lines have been repainted, posts have been strategically placed to prevent users hitting our neighbours fence on the lower side and wood edging has been placed along the top side to prevent the bank spreading onto the car park. Then there is the bank, a mass of brambles and weeds. What to do with it? When you're not a gardener you ask someone else. So, under the guidance of Sheila, a team has been beavering away. Comments from visitors and neighbours have been very positive and appreciative of the work done to make the environment around the church better for us and our neighbours and users.

All of that is to inform you of my total and utter ignorance of anything horticultural. So I cringe when a story comes up of sowing, planting, pruning, fruiting etc. (Three of the churches in my first appointment were rural and made up of farming families.)

So it is with trepidation that I think about this passage in John's Gospel. Sheila is our gardener at Keswick and she seems to know all about planting and nurturing plants and gardens to get the best out of them (well almost all no doubt has some advice from others). The results will be brilliant. The writer of the Gospel is referring to God as the gardner but not meaning planting and nurturing plants but rather planting, or should I say pruning and nurturing people's lives. If we want to be fruitful in the way that God wishes us to be we need to allow him to take away that which holds us back and to allow him to nurture us.

That is why, in the first instance we need to have a close relationship with Jesus. The branch gets its nutrition through the vine and so we get our Christian nutrition through Jesus. So, as we come closer to the end of the pandemic restrictions, how is your relationship with Christ. Have you discovered that life is much better without your Sunday worship each week – I hope not. Have you found that YouTube and Zoom services, if you could access them, have been helpful but not quite the same and you feel a bit of a disconnection from Jesus. Similarly with the written services, helpful but not quite the same. Maybe you have found everything has served you quite well and you still feel as close to God as ever.

Whichever has been true for you we are getting to that time when communal worship can restart and getting nearer to the time when it can be back to what it was. In that coming back we, as the church, have a responsibility to look at what has happened and to consider how we enable people improve/maintain/strengthen their relationship with Christ. We cannot just go back to what we always did and we cannot just embrace YouTube or Zoom because different people have found different things helpful as God has sought to nurture them It is not just about maintaining people's relationship with Jesus though. As the writer said, 'God prunes those branches (us) which don't bear fruit' .Fewer and fewer people appear to see the need to have a relationship with Jesus and yet, as Christians, we know how important that relationship is. In what ways in the future is the church going to demonstrate that a relationship with Christ is important. The simple answer is that we do what Jesus did. He cared about people. We have done that during the pandemic through telephone calls, pastoral letters, written services, seasonal gifts, practical help, volunteering at foodbanks etc and online services.

We've learned through the pandemic restrictions what it is like to be isolated from family and friends. We've learned what it is like to not be able to do that which we have usually done be that sports, fell walking socialising or whatever. Let us feed that into our thinking about where we go from here as churches and let us make sure that whatever we do we make sure that everyone knows that they are welcome and loved, not just by us as the church but also by Jesus. And as we do this make sure we keep close to Jesus who feeds us through his Spirit.
