Bible Reading – Mark 5 : verses 21 - 43 Jesus Heals a Dead Girl and a Suffering Woman

Jesus went across the Sea of Galilee in a boat. It landed at the other side. There a large crowd gathered around him. Then a man named Jairus came. He was a synagogue leader. When he saw Jesus, he fell at his feet. He begged Jesus, "Please come. My little daughter is dying. Place your hands on her to heal her. Then she will live." So Jesus went with him.

A large group of people followed. They crowded around him. A woman was there who had a sickness that made her bleed. It had lasted for 12 years. She had suffered a great deal, even though she had gone to many doctors. She had spent all the money she had. But she was getting worse, not better. Then she heard about Jesus. She came up behind him in the crowd and touched his clothes. She thought, "I just need to touch his clothes. Then I will be healed." Right away her bleeding stopped. She felt in her body that her suffering was over.

At once Jesus knew that power had gone out from him. He turned around in the crowd. He asked, "Who touched my clothes?"

"You see the people," his disciples answered. "They are crowding against you. And you still ask, 'Who touched me?'"

But Jesus kept looking around. He wanted to see who had touched him. Then the woman came and fell at his feet. She knew what had happened to her. She was shaking with fear. But she told him the whole truth. He said to her, "Dear woman, your faith has healed you. Go in peace. You are free from your suffering."

While Jesus was still speaking, some people came from the house of Jairus. He was the synagogue leader. "Your daughter is dead," they said. "Why bother the teacher anymore?"

Jesus heard what they were saying. He told the synagogue leader, "Don't be afraid. Just believe."

He let only Peter, James, and John, the brother of James, follow him. They came to the home of the synagogue leader. There Jesus saw a lot of confusion. People were crying and sobbing loudly. He went inside. Then he said to them, "Why all this confusion and sobbing? The child is not dead. She is only sleeping." But they laughed at him.

He made them all go outside. He took only the child's father and mother and the disciples who were with him. And he went in where the child was. He took her by the hand. Then he said to her, "Talitha koum!" This means, "Little girl, I say to you, get up!" The girl was 12 years old. Right away she stood up and began to walk around. They were totally amazed at this. Jesus gave strict orders not to let anyone know what had happened. And he told them to give her something to eat.

Talk / Reflection

This weeks Gospel reading covers two healing stories, a bleeding woman and a synagogue ruler's daughter who had died, I take it that bringing back to life from death can be counted as a healing.

The woman had heard about Jesus and their paths crossed when Jesus was on the way to the home of Jairus to see to his daughter. At that time a large crowd was gathered around Jesus making it almost impossible to get to him. It was a human wall. No doubt having heard some of the stories about Jesus the woman was determined to get to him. She believed that just touching him would make a difference to her which no doctor had been able to do for the last twelve years. Her determination to touch Jesus got her through the crowd and into a position where she could do just that. She touched his clothes and immediately her bleeding stopped and so did Jesus. He turned round and wanted to know who had touched him. Imagine how alert Jesus must have been to sense that particular touch amongst all the other touches that happened while the crowd milled around him. But he did and he knows what we need in the midst of all that demands his attention the individual is important to him. He recognises what we need and freely gives.

Her determination to get to Jesus because she expected him to meet her needs paid off and she was healed.

This story raises two questions for me. Do we turn to Jesus for help when we are in need? Are we so determined to get that help that nothing puts us off getting to the place at the feet of Jesus to receive that help?

It was similar with the daughter of Jairus except that it was the determination of the father to bring Jesus to his daughter which brought healing.

Jairus was a synagogue ruler, a group which had close ties with the Pharisees. and therefore would have been under pressure not to support Jesus. Yet here we find him falling at the feet of Jesus and pleading with him to come to his house and heal his daughter who was dying. He just wanted Jesus to come and put his hands on her so that she would be healed. He obviously wasn't your standard synagogue ruler if he believed that would happen and if he was prepared to ignore all the criticism and persecution he would experience as a result of his request to Jesus.

Jairus must have been getting impatient with Jesus when he stopped to find out who had touched him. Surely that wasn't important at this time when Jesus needed to get to the sick daughter. And then word came that the daughter had died and they were too late. Imagine his feelings of despair. Yet Jesus didn't bat an eyelid just said 'Do not be afraid. Just believe.'

People felt it was a waste of time going any further but Jesus knew different and continued on the journey. As a result the little girl was healed.

I wonder if we are prepared to go against the views of those around us to bring Jesus to those who need him. Or do we shy away because we are frightened of the mocking and scoffing which might result. Or perhaps we give up when an obstacle is placed in our way and things don't happen as we expect. This story shows us not to let what others might say to us stop us from talking to Jesus and introducing people to him. It also shows us that our timetable isn't always the correct one and therefore we shouldn't give up if hold ups occur. God can make any situation right no matter how late he may appear to be on the scene.

Pray for that same determination, the ability to ignore the scoffing of others, and the willingness to work to God's timetable.
