

# Eco Roof Appeal Update

We seem to have been raising money to renew our roof and install solar panels for a long time, but it's only been about two years. Our initial target was £200,000 but we discovered when going to tender that costs had risen and we've had to raise another £45,000!

Thanks to some amazing donations, some generous grants and lots of fundraising activities we've so far raised £238,000. Which means we've only £7,000 left to find for the roof work.

Earlier this year we wrote to members and friends and as a result we received a number of financial gifts and offers of loans. This meant we could go ahead and the builders started work in September, aiming to finish in December.

We're extremely grateful for the response from everyone and hope we won't need to take up any of the offers of loans if we can raise the last of the money needed in other ways.


## From Kina and Paul

# Latest news from the Methodist Church in Britain

The Methodist Church joins Christians Against Poverty in calling for adequate incomes

Christians Against Poverty (CAP) has written to Ministers in the Department for Work and Pensions calling for action. This comes after their latest policy report *Deficit budgets: the cost to stay alive* revealed that 22% of adults in the UK are living with a deficit budget - meaning they don't have enough income to cover their basic needs.

# Along with CAP, the Methodist Church joins 16 other signatories calling for the Government to:

- Review the rate of social security and minimum wage to ensure a floor is set so that people receive a protected minimum amount ensuring no one is pushed into deprivation.
- Develop a strategy to guarantee that every individual and household across the UK receives the social security they are entitled to.
